Meet Your Neighbor Ruia Roberts - 314B

Snowshoe Mountain and Snowcrest have brought tremendous joy to me and my girls, and I am sincerely grateful for the opportunity to own a small piece of the Snowshoe wonderland.

I first visited Snowshoe the year it opened, and it was truly one of the worst experiences of my life. I attempted to learn to ski in jeans. By the time I had reached the absolute limit of my endurance, I could see every place I had fallen—my brand-new jeans had faded onto the snow. If memory serves me correctly, I also suffered greatly at the hands of the rope tow.

Years later, I began skiing a couple of times each year and quietly dreaming of owning a condo on the mountain. That opportunity presented itself in 2000 when a family friend and I joined together to purchase 314B. The unit needed significant work and was decorated in a full beach theme—but the beautiful western view was captivating. My daughters were in elementary school when we purchased the unit, so it has always been “home” to them.

My name is Ruia Roberts. I am a retired band and choir director, though I still serve in long-term substitute positions with Kanawha County Schools. Ken Hartman, a retired dentist, and I have co-owned the unit for many years, and that western view never diminishes. 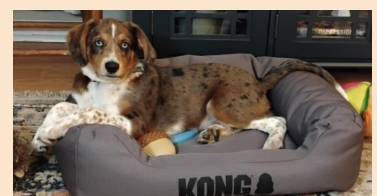
Again, I am deeply grateful for this beautiful place and the community that surrounds it.
